Message from the Superintendent

Coverage on Survey Continued

As stated in the last edition of the Our Voice, the district will continue to share the results of the surveys that were distributed to the community in the October 2012 edition. No clear direction was given to the district on how best to proceed financially to stabilize the district's economic future. The following graph displays the results of the survey:



	Raw number out of 84 surveys	Percentage
Seek a permanent improvement levy	35	42%
Seek an income tax	31	37%
Offer larger classes	19	23%
Consolidate	5	6%
Stop maintaining the building	4	5%
Charge rental fees	52	62%
Shut down facility-outside activities	27	32%
Cut transportation	26	31%

As you can see there was only one idea that resonated with the community and that is to charge rental fees. To clarify, the district does already charge rental fees. However, the Board has always tried to allow access to the building to community groups. The philosophy is that the community built this building 10 years ago and we have attempted to give the community access to the building if the activity included Tri -Village students. However, other entities were charged to use the facility. Unfortunately, even if we charge each group that currently uses the building we would not generate significant revenue. The idea was included in the survey, because people had asked for the item to be included, but realistically it is not an option that will make a significant impact on the annual budget.

As a result of the survey, we have negotiated a rental fee with the Wee Patriots Preschool. However, this is not a practice that most schools implement with pre-school units. Generally, the school district sees the benefit educationally of having students enrolled in a preschool and waives any rental agreements, but based on the response of the survey we will listen to the will of the people and charge the Wee Patriots for the use of the building.
