



Tri-Village Local School District's general fund receives revenue from several sources. Twenty percent of the District's revenues originate from real estate property taxes which consist of agriculture, residential, industrial and commercial collections. Public utilities receipts constitute just over 5.5% of revenues. The school income tax levy generates approximately thirteen percent of the general fund revenues. Revenues received from the State of Ohio are known as School Foundation dollars which amount to 45.5% of the budget. Less than one percent of restricted grants are received from the State as well. This stream of revenue includes economically disadvantaged funding and career tech education funding. Just over three percent of funding is derived from property tax allocations which include rollback and homestead exemptions. Finally, almost twelve percent of the District's general fund revenue budget is received as miscellaneous income which includes student open enrollment, special education tuition payments, building rentals, donations, interest income and other reimbursements or refunds.



Each biennium, the State of Ohio approves a new budget for distribution to public schools. The current budget, known as House Bill 64, has funded fiscal year 2015-2016 and the current fiscal year, 2016-2017. HB 64 was a very positive budget for Tri-Village as new components of revenue were added to the School Foundation settlements which greatly benefited the District. The new components included capacity aid, a transportation supplement, third grade reading proficiency bonus and high school graduation rate bonus. Capacity aid provides additional funding for school districts where the income generated for one mill of property tax is below the state median for what is generated. The transportation supplement provides additional funding based on rider density and the number of miles driven by school buses. The District is comprised of 86 square miles with seven bus drivers driving the daily routes. In fiscal year 2016, these new components increased State Foundation revenues by over twenty percent as compared to the previous year.

Legislators are currently reviewing the biennium budget for fiscal years 2018 and 2019 known as House Bill 49. This bill should be approved by Governor Kasich in late June with an effective date of July 1, 2017.



Throughout the 16-17 school year the technology department (John Lay) here at Tri-Village worked on multiple projects. Primarily, a transition from first class to google apps for education. Google Apps for Education, or known as G-Suite today, offers student, faculty and staff, and administrative personnel 21st century collaboration and productivity tools. These tools include word processing, spreadsheets, presentation software, email, file storage, and digital classrooms. Adding approximately 230 chromebooks this summer, we seek to further engage students with 21st century G-Suite technologies. This summer we will prepare for full scale adoption of G-Suite for students and staff by continuing to offer an array of professional development opportunities.

This summer we will also be working to update all computers to Microsoft's latest operating system Windows 10, installing new interactive projectors in six classrooms, updating our virus protection programs, installing a few new media center devices, and updating the software in the stem lab.

Deputy Mark Garbig will serve as the District's SRO for 2.5 days a week beginning in August. Additionally, our Safety Coordinator, Dale Ary will serve on campus the other 2.5 days a week. As a result, the district will have full security coverage daily providing a safe learning environment for students and staff.

What a School Resource Officer Program is

A School Resource Officer (SRO) program places law enforcement officers/deputies in schools with the goal of creating and maintaining a safe, secure, and orderly learning environment for students, teachers, and staff. An SRO program reflects a community's desire to ensure that its schools are safe, secure and orderly. SROs represent a proactive strategy designed to bring prevention and intervention into schools.
