School nurses and school-based health centers (SBHCs): Partnership for success



School nurses

School nurses are the first line of illness and injury triage in schools for children. School nurses provide a wide array of services and supports including:

- •health screenings
- medication administration
- •chronic disease management
- •health education
- emergency planning
- training school staff
- health assessments
- •environmental health
- •and much, much more!



SBHCs

SBHCs operate from a dedicated space on a school campus to ensure students have access to, at minimum, primary care. With parental/guardian consent, SBHCs can offer a wide array of services including:

- •well-child care
- •laboratory services
- immunizations
- •illness and injury acute visits
- work permit exams
- sports physicals
- chronic disease management
- specialty care referrals

An SBHC complements and supports but does not replace or duplicate school nurse services in fact, the most effective SBHCs have strong relationships with their school's nurse and broader school health services team. 1 Together, SBHCs and school nurses can provide a comprehensive, integrated, and robust school-based health care infrastructure that meets the school community's needs and improves student health, wellbeing, and academic success.

School nurses and SBHCs share a common mission to ensure students are healthy and ready to learn.



The school health services team includes school nurses, psychologists, counselors, social workers, health aides, and
other health professionals employed or contracted by the school.

What is a school-based health center?

School-based health centers (SBHCs) are an evidence-driven strategy that brings health care to where our youngest Ohioans spend most of their time – school. SBHCs are created through a partnership between a school/ school district and a community healthcare provider to provide access to, at minimum, comprehensive primary care services to students on a school campus. The healthcare provider (also referred to as the SBHC operator) runs the daytoday operations of the SBHC.

In addition to providing comprehensive primary care services, SBHCs often provide behavioral, oral, and vision health services, as well as care coordination and social services and supports.



What does this partnership look like?

SBHCs are an important vehicle to support school nurses and extend the care and services school nurses can provide. At the same time, school nurses are integral to the success and sustainability of an SBHC. It's important that school nurses serve on SBHC planning and advisory boards and are engaged in the development of an SBHC's operational plan. In addition to supporting SBHC planning, school nurses work in partnership with SBHCs to:

- •Identify student health needs and gaps in care
- •Act as a liaison with school staff to increase awareness of the SBHC and other school health services
- •Increase student, family, and community awareness of the SBHC and other school health services
- •Work with families to promote and secure SBHC parental/guardian consent
- •Serve as a gate keeper for student referrals to the SBHC
- •Partner with the SBHC to manage student's chronic conditions and ensure students are up to date on school-required immunizations

This collaborative healthcare and education partnership puts students and families at the heart of its services and is transformational in improving health and education outcomes.

WOAC Ticket Pricing

As some of you may have seen, the WOAC recently made a change to ticket pricing for athletic events as a result of Ohio House Bill 147 that was passed. Here are what those changes look like:

These prices became effective as of the WINTER SPORTS season.

ALL High School and Middle School athletic events at all WOAC schools will be:

- Adult price of \$7
- Student price of \$5
- Senior Citizen (age 62+) price of \$5
- This is again for all ticketed events. which will also now include Baseball and Softball.

Family All Sports Passes and Adult All Sports Passes are now only purchased online on our website through Home Town Ticketing. To access, go to the TV Athletics website: https://trivillagepatriots.com/
From here, click on the "More" tab, and then on "Tickets". Scroll to bottom of page for 2024-2025 Passes, click on "Get Passes" button. From this page, you will have the options to purchase Family All Sports Passes or Adult All Sports Passes in the quantity you would like. Please understand, there is a processing charge of \$4.88.

For all Tri-Village K-12 students, they can receive a free All Sports Student Season Pass for all home games, excluding tournaments. See Melissa in the JH/HS office!



PREPARING FOR STATE TESTING - TV STYLE

The high school student council, National Honor Society, Key Club and high school class officers teamed up with Mrs. Dyson to "cheer on the elementary" as many of them start state testing. The goal was to encourage the elementary students to remember they are important and to wish them luck on state testing. A great time was had by all.

The high school student council was busy during the month of April sponsoring activities and putting together goodie bags for students in grades 7 - 11 who were state testing. Dress up days, a door decorating contest and a coloring contest were some of the activities planned to kick off our state testing month. The week before state testing was wrapped up with a dance party in the junior high gym for all students grades 7 - 12. The high school student council worked hard to promote positive student interaction as well as encouraging students to do well on the state tests.



General Guidelines for Keeping Children Home from School Due to Illness

It is sometimes difficult to decide when and how long to keep an ill child home from school. The timing of the absence is often important in order to decrease the spread of disease to others and to prevent your child from acquiring any other illness while his/her resistance is lowered. The following guidelines represent the more common childhood illnesses and the usual recommendations of the Ohio Department of Health.

CHICKEN POX: Your child should remain home until all blisters have scabbed over, usually 6 days after the appearance of the first crop of blisters.

COMMON COLD: Your child should remain home if symptoms are serious enough to interfere with your child's ability to learn.

FEVER: If your child's temperature is 100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater he/she should remain home until he/she has been fever-free (without the use of fever-reducing medicine) for a full 24 hours. Remember fever is symptom indicating the presence of an illness.

FLU: Abrupt onset of fever, chills, headache and sore muscles. Your child should remain home from school until symptoms are gone and the child is without a fever for 24 hours.

HEAD LICE: Following lice infestation, please accompany your child to school the morning after receiving treatment. The school nurse or trained staff will check to make sure there are no live bugs and that progress has been made in removing nits.

IMPETIGO: Your child should remain home from school until receiving 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and sores are no longer draining.

PAIN: If your child complains, or behavior indicates, that he/she is experiencing persistent pain, he/she should be evaluated by a physician before your child is sent to school.

PINKEYE: Your child should remain home from school until receiving 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and discharge from the eye has stopped.

SKIN RASHES: Skin rashes of unknown origin should be evaluated by a physician before your child goes to school.

STREP THROAT AND SCARLET FEVER: Your child should remain home from school until receiving a full 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and until he/she is without fever or vomiting for 24 hours.


VOMITING AND DIARRHEA: Your child should remain at home until vomiting, diarrhea or fever has ceased for a full 24 hours. If your child has had any of these symptoms during the night he/she should not be sent to school the following day.
