School fees are now due and are \$60. for grades K-6. Grade cards will not be issued until this fee is paid.

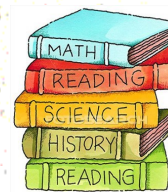


WATCH D.O.G.S. Sign ups

A message from the school nurse....

Hearing and Vision screenings are being completed for all kindergarten, 1st, 3rd, and 5th grade students. Also, all new elementary students and any teacher or parent request for screenings of additional students are being completed. If you have a concern about your child's hearing or vision, please contact the school nurse. I will be happy to screen or re-screen any student who is referred by a parent or teacher.

In an effort to keep our classrooms a **safe place for every child**, we ask that you **keep food allergies in mind** when sending treats to school for birthdays and holiday parties this year. Please refrain from sending any treats that contain peanuts, peanut product, or any other type of nut. Also, please label homemade treats with ingredients. Thank you for your help! REASONS TO KEEP YOUR CHILD HOME FROM SCHOOL

Chicken Pox: Your child should remain home until all blisters have scabbed over, usually 6 days after the appearance of the first crop of blisters.

Common Cold: Your child should remain home if symptoms are serious enough to interfere with your child's ability to learn.

Fever: If your child's temperature is 100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater he/she should remain home until he/she has been fever-free (without the use of fever medicine) for a full 24 hours. Remember fever is a symptom indicating the presence of an illness.

Flu: Abrupt onset of a fever, chills, headache and sore muscles. Your child should remain home from school until symptoms are gone and the child is without a fever for 24 hours.

Head Lice: Following lice infestation, please accompany your child to school the morning after receiving treatment. The school nurse or trained staff will check to make sure there are no live bugs and that progress has been made to remove nits.

Impetigo: Your child should remain home from school until receiving 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and sores are no longer draining.

Pain: If your child complains, or behavior indicates that he/she is experiencing pain, he/she should be evaluated by a physician before your child is sent to school.

Pinkeye: Your child should remain home from school until receiving 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and discharge from the eye has stopped.

Skin Rashes: Skin rashes of unknown origin should be evaluated by a physician before your child goes to school.

Strep Throat and Scarlet Fever: Your child should remain home from school until receiving a full 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and until he/she is without vomiting for 24 hours.

Vomiting and Diarrhea: Your child should remain home until vomiting, diarrhea or fever has ceased for a full 24 hours. If your child has had any of these symptoms during the night, he/she should not be sent to school the following day.
